Ofsted Inspection

My sincere thanks to all those parents and carers who completed the Ofsted Parent View survey. There was an unbelievably high response rate (517 responses/31% of total student numbers) of which, as far as I can see from published figures, is unmatched by any school, in percentage terms, that has been inspected in Surrey over the last two years. The feedback was exceptionally positive. This fantastic backing is very much appreciated and says much about how our parents support the College. Thank you.

As you may know, I cannot give you any more information at this stage or tell you of the outcome of the inspection until it has been quality assured. It will be 30 days before the report is published.

As soon as this happens, I will inform you of exactly what the inspectors thought about Collingwood. I think, for now, all I can say is that your support and the excellent work by staff and students has given them a clear picture of our strengths.

JCQ Guidance about Summer Examinations 2022

Last week we received JCQ (Joint Council Qualifications) clarification on managing the summer examinations. I have detailed the significant points below and links to the key documents should you wish to read the new guidance in more detail.

- Firstly, after two years, JCQ have confirmed that examinations are going ahead!
- Where a student cannot attend an exam, but can attend other components, special consideration (see section on Page 3) should be applied for in the normal way.
- If a student in Years 9, 10 and 12 cannot attend any examinations in a qualification, they should sit the exam in the next series, as usual.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL ...

Special Consideration

This is used where a student has temporarily experienced an illness or injury, or another event outside of their control, which is likely to have adversely affected their ability to demonstrate their knowledge and skills during the examination.

The JCQ (Joint Qualifications Council) definition of special consideration is:

Special consideration is a post -examination adjustment to candidate's mark or grade. This is to reflect temporary illness, temporary injury, or some other event outside of the candidate's control at **the time of the assessment**. It is applied when the issue or event has had or is reasonably likely to have had, a material effect on the candidate's ability to take an assessment or demonstrate her or his normal level of attainment in an assessment. Candidates may be eligible for special consideration due to the impact of COVID-19—see below section.

For more detailed information on the standard special consideration processes, please refer to the JCQ document, <u>'A guide to the Special Consideration Process</u>.' which includes information about the types of special consideration available, the eligibility of candidates, and the application process. There is a relaxation of the rules in 2022 in applying for special consideration on the grounds of **absence**. Candidates will be eligible to get a grade if they have completed **one unit of an exam** and if their application meets the 'special consideration criteria' from the exam board.

COVID-19: Special considerations for students with symptoms or positive test results.

JCQ have updated its guidance on special considerations to consider UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) guidance. The guidance explains that an 'acceptable reason' for special considerations include a student staying at home and avoiding contact with others, in line with UKHSA guidance, at the time of the examination. This could be because of symptoms in the guidance such as a high temperature or a positive COVID-19 test result.

If a **student has tested** positive for COVID-19 or is unwell with relevant symptoms, UKHSA guidance is clear that the student should stay at home. The student should not attend examinations for the time period recommended by UKHSA. This is **three days** for children and young people 18 years old and under, or **five days** for adults 19 and over.

If a student is unwell on the day of their examination, they should email the exams team at <u>exams@collingwood.surrey.sch.uk</u> as soon as possible if they require the College to apply for special consideration for any missed examinations as soon as possible.

If a student doesn't attend their examination, their parent/carer may need to <u>fill in a Form14</u> (selfcertification for candidates who have missed an examination) and email this to <u>exams@collingwood.surrey.sch.uk</u> within a week of the missed exam. The exams team will confirm this on receipt of the student email request. JCQ have also provided a helpful Frequently Asked Questions <u>(FAQs) document</u>.

For Examinations in Summer 2022 Series

There will be a minimum of **10** days between examinations in each GCSE and 'A' level subject, to reduce the chance of students missing all examinations in a subject due to this 'acceptable reason'. Students will be awarded a grade where they've completed the assessment(s) for at **least one** whole component within the specification if their application for 'special consideration' meets the exam board criteria.

Malpractice

If a centre suspects the authenticity of the details provided by the student and parent/carer on the Form 14, then JCQ have advised centres to investigate the matter using the standard JCQ policy and procedures for malpractice. If malpractice were to be found the student's results could be withdrawn or the student could be disqualified from the qualification(s).

In the final days leading up to the start of the examinations I would like to encourage students to attend revision sessions and to refer to their OneNote pages where their teachers are putting all advanced information, topic lists and resources from lessons and the exam boards to support them with their exam preparations.

Good luck to all our students for their forthcoming examinations - we know you will be fabulous!

EXAM CERTIFICATES

Exam certificate postage payment is available on ParentPay. Please ensure payment is made as soon as possible to ensure your child receives their exam certificates for the Summer 2022 season. This is of particular importance for those students in Years 11 and 13 who are leaving the College.

To avoid certificates being lost in transit or left crumpled at the bottom of a school bag, we encourage payment to be made for Years 9 and 10 too.

For those that make payment for postage, exam certificates are usually despatched in December using Royal Mail's 'Signed For' service.

Certificates will be required by future employers and further education institutes. If you don't have your certificates when you need them in later life, the exam boards can provide a replacement statement of results but it is very costly.

SURREY YOUTH GAMES





Registration is open until 20 May 2022, for beginners aged 7-16yrs to access a range of FREE activities, across Surrey.

For more than two decades the Specsavers Surrey Youth Games has been giving young people their first taste of a way to stay active, build new skills and make new friends – all for free.

Organised by Active Surrey, the programme is aimed at young people who are not club members and struggle to access opportunities, due to a lack of travel options or family circumstances. Thanks to free training provided by their local council, 7-16 year olds can choose an activity and go from complete beginner to competent player in as little as six to eight weeks. Taking part helps children make friends and unearth hidden talents as they develop their skills and have the chance to attend a free celebration event at the Surrey Sports Park in June.

How kids can get involved

Activities vary by age and availability but every borough and district in Surrey is offering free training now. To take part, parents or carers just need to register their child online, which can be done via the Active Surrey website <u>www.activesurrey.com/SYG</u>

Depending on age, children can get involved in street basketball, inclusive dance, judo, tennis, girls' football and GoTri (indoor row, cycle and an outside run).

Emma Das, Event Lead Officer at Active Surrey is looking forward to seeing young 'Gamers' build their confidence as they work towards the main celebration event on Saturday 18 June: "After a tough two years for young people, the Specsavers Surrey Youth Games programme is a great example of councils and communities pulling together to create something fun for those kids who don't always get the chance to be involved in physical activity and try something new."

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ATTENDANCE - LEAVE OF ABSENCE/ HOLIDAY REQUESTS

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

ON BEHALF OF SURREY AND BORDERS PARTNERSHIP - OUT OF HOURS SUPPORT FOR PARENTS/CARERS

Science Influences! J

Kusala Rajendran is an earth scientist whose research focuses on earthquakes and their patterns. Her work on **seismology** (the study of earthquakes) has led to her being recognised as one of the pioneers in this research field. She currently works as a professor at the Centre for Earth Science in India.


Rajendran has worked on every significant earthquake that has happened in India in recent years. After the **tsunami** (a large wave caused by an underwater volcanic eruption or earthquake) that occurred in the Indian Ocean in 2004, Rajendran travelled to the south-Indian state of Tamil Nadu to study past tsunamis. There, she unearthed a layer of ancient soil that had come all the way from the ocean floor. This provided evidence of a similar tsunami that cook place approximately 1000 years ago.


