





DRAMA STUDENTS ENJOY PERFORMANCE WORKSHOP

On Friday 3 March our A Level Drama students took part in a performance workshop at Reading Rep Theatre. During this workshop, our students had the opportunity to work on building tension in performance and adapting texts for a modern audience. They also had the chance to watch a production of Hedda Gabler (play written by Norwegian playwright Henrik Ibsen), starring Anna Popplewell as Hedda.

The workshop was led by experienced professionals in the performance arts industry, who challenged our students to think creatively and develop their skills in performance. The students learned about the importance of building tension in performance and were given the chance to explore techniques such as pacing, tone and body language to create a sense of anticipation in their performances.

Industrial Action

As you will be aware, following my newsletter article on Wednesday 1 March, I have been consulting with our staff union representatives about further industrial action. There is no requirement for staff members to inform me in advance if they will be taking action on these days. Following our risk assessment analysis and modelling, assuming that similar numbers of staff who took strike action on Thursday 2 March will strike on Wednesday 15 and Thursday 16 March, then we will not be able to keep the College fully open. I have therefore made the decision that we will again need a partial closure but that we will be able to accommodate three year groups safely over these two days as outlined on Page 3.

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ON BEHALF OF SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL: SAFER TRAVEL SCHOOL SURVEY

Collingwood is assisting Surrey County Council's Safer Travel Team to undertake research with parents on students' types of travel to and from school. This follows the huge success that the previous survey had, with over 170 schools taking part in last year's survey.

As a direct result of the previous surveys Surrey County Council has secured an additional £3 million funding to improve measures outside schools to make walking and cycling and scooting to school easier and safer.

The objective of the research is to develop a better understanding of the different types of travel, how frequently they're used and why that type is used. Once the Safer Travel Team has collected and analysed this information provided by parents, its goal is to obtain a better understanding of journeys to school, so it can continue encouraging safer and more active travel to school for all children in Surrey.


POSTCARD FROM ANTARCTICA

The Geography Department was again lucky to receive a letter from The RRS Sir David Attenborough Research ship as it made its way from Portsmouth to Rothera research Station in Antarctica.

Mike is the Electronics Officer on board the research ship and wrote to us to describe the journey the ship took and what life was like during the 9000 mile journey for the 82 people on board.

In the letter Mike describes the wildlife they saw along the way (flying fish, seals, penguins, birds and a humpback whale), where they saw their first iceberg and that there is an active volcano on Deception Island

Year 7 students are using the letter in their Geography lessons to find out more about Antarctica and also investigate the range of careers linked to research in Antarctica. On board the RRS Attenborough there are more non-scientists than scientists!

COMPUTING WOOD



OXFORD UNIVERSITY COMPUTING CHALLENGE

WHAT IS THE CHALLENGE?

The OUCC Challenge is set by Oxford University with merits and distinctions awarded by the UK Bebras.

In a 40 minute round, pupils were asked to solve as many computational problems as possible. Although the OUCC is designed, the solutions must be created using programming code, and this is where the skills required for computer science come into force.

This year we had 44 students compete in the OUCC, with Arthur Voinescu coming away with a distinction.

Rather than flexing knowledge, the challenge requires contestants to think outside the box to use problem-solving techniques such as abstraction, decomposition and pattern recognition. These are considered the basis of computer science and programming.
