





During the October half-term break, 30 students and 3 staff (Mrs Magness, Mr Magness and Mrs Walker) travelled to Iceland for the trip of a lifetime. We began our journey flying from Heathrow to Keflavik where we met our tour guide (Bernie) and our coach driver (Palli).

On the way to our lovely tidy and clean accommodation at Guesthouse Bitra, we stopped off at 'the bridge between two continents' and Gunnuhver, where we were able to walk amongst mud pools and steam vents and view the vigorously bubbling landscape, which is home to Iceland's largest mud pool with a diameter of 20 m! These mud pools formed when steam generated from a geothermal reservoir emanated and condensed, mixing with surface water. Accompanying gases such as carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulphide make the water acidic, which causes alteration of the lava to clay.

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UPDATE ON FUNDS RAISED AT CHARITY QUIZ NIGHT

On Friday 14 July, myself and Sophie Cherry, who were the Head Students in the last academic year, organised a charity quiz night and a silent auction to raise money. This was a very successful event where we managed to raise £1200.

ATTENDANCE - LEAVE OF ABSENCE/ HOLIDAY REQUESTS

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.



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Upon arrival at Guesthouse Bitra we were treated to a hearty meal of Mexican chicken soup with nachos, cheese and sour cream followed by chocolate brownie for pudding! Mrs Magness and Mrs Walker tried to stay awake to look out for The Northern Lights but had to head in to bed after feeling tired from the day of travel, only to then come down to breakfast the next morning to hear that Aric and James had managed to spot them from their room overnight and had not thought to wake anyone!

On Thursday 26 October, after a hearty breakfast with so many options available, the group departed the accommodation for Skógafoss – one of Iceland's most impressive waterfalls – with a wide, thundering curtain of water 60 m high. Skogafoss is unique as it comes directly

from two glaciers, Eyjafjallajokull and Myrdalsjokull. Many of the group walked up the great many steps to the side of the waterfall to view it from the very top too!

We all returned to the coach to travel to Reynisfjara for a walk along the black volcanic beach to see magnificent basalt cliffs and caves. Luckily the tide was out and we were able to get close enough to the great basalt columns for a few photos. Many ended up going into the café for a quick hot chocolate as it was very windy by the beach and we kept getting blasted with sand!



After lunch, we made our way to Solheimajokull. Upon arrival, the experienced glacier walking guides kitted out the group with crampons, harnesses, hard hats and ice axes and explained how to use all the equipment before then heading off onto the frozen glacier tongue to explore the ice sculptures and deep crevasses. Some of the group even chose to sample some of the fresh water flowing from the glacier!




Towards the end of the day we drove to Seljalandsfoss, a waterfall whose plume spills 60 m over a former sea cliff and which is now sited far inland due to isostatic rebound. The group were able to walk right behind the waterfall and even got to explore a slightly lesser-known waterfall close by called Gljúfrabúi by squeezing through a narrow gorge!



We returned to Guesthouse Bitra in the evening for a delicious meal of lasagne and salad followed by a dessert of ice cream with all the toppings!

After dinner it was back to 'Northern Lights spotting' and we were thrilled to be treated to a full display that evening (and at a reasonable hour!) enabling us to capture some spectacular, 'once in a lifetime' photos.



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On Friday 27 October, after breakfast, the group went lava tube caving. However, due to recent earthquake activity in the Blue Mountains region we were originally booked in to explore, the location of the activity had to be changed slightly – not a problem though as it actually meant our students got the opportunity to explore a bigger and better lava tube cave!

During the underground journey, everyone had to duck under low rocks and crawl through some smaller sections and when they all turned off their headtorches inside

for a few minutes, they all got to experience what it really means to be in complete darkness and not be able to see their hand in front of their faces!

At lunchtime, we visited Hveragerði which is known as a 'greenhouse town.' Whilst at the Hveragerdi Geothermal Centre we witnessed a collection of hot springs and solfataras and watched the staff from the centre boil eggs in the hot springs! We also got an opportunity to sample some warm rye bread which had been baked overnight for about 18 hours in the hot steam!

In the afternoon, we then made our way to Eldhestar, a traditional Icelandic Horse Riding centre. This gave the group a fantastic opportunity to enjoy a trek on a pure bred Icelandic horse whilst experiencing the unique countryside. For many, this was a highlight of the trip but for others less trusting of the beautiful horses, it was a



more nerve-wracking experience!

In the evening, we returned to Guesthouse Bitra for Dominos Pizzas followed by some freshly made sweet waffles and a whole load of toppings! Many students chose to watch the Rugby World Cup Match taking place that evening. Mr Magness then hosted a quiz night for all to enjoy – two groups walked away with Icelandic chocolate prizes!



On Saturday 28 October the group departed in the morning to travel to Gullfoss waterfall, a magnificent two-stage waterfall which marks the edge of the highland shelf where the Hvita River plunges 33 m into a mile long gorge.

The gorge was formed by flash flood waters that forced their way through the cracks in the basalt lava layers. The average water flow is around 110 m3/s, varying in colour between a deep aqua and a translucent grey as a result of glacial run off. We then had the opportunity for some souvenir shopping at the visitors centre and café before continuing on to Geysir.

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Geysir is a spouting hot spring that gave its name to all the world's geysers. Although it doesn't often spout nowadays, its neighbour 'Strokkur' erupts every 10 -15 minutes reaching a height of around 30 m! This is one of the trio of natural wonders on the Golden Circle route. Several of the group walked up to the viewing point which looked out over the fumaroles, emanating steam and gas into the air. There was then a second opportunity for a souvenir shop and café stop before lunch.


After lunch, we travelled to Þingvellir (Thingvellir), the national park where Iceland's parliament was established in 930AD. The site straddles the Mid-Atlantic

Ridge, its rift valley forming where the Eurasian and North American tectonic plates pull apart at an average of 3 cm a year. We walked among the rifts and gazed into water-filled fissure noticing how clear the water was having been filtered through lava.

We all then walked to where the snorkelling staff were based, got changed into our drysuits and picked up our snorkels before lowering ourselves into the near-freezing waters of the fissure. Silfra is a fissure between the North American and Eurasian continental plates and constantly fills with glacial water that has been trickling through underground lava rock for 30 years. This remarkable crack between

and constantly fills with glacial water that has been trickling through underground lava rock for 30 years. This remarkable crack between two tectonic plates is therefore filled with the clearest water on our planet, allowing for over 100 m visibility

looking down over the incredible and astonishing colours below. The guides helped us swim (or rather, 'float') through the four parts of the Silfra fissure.





The morning of Sunday 29 October saw us say a sad farewell to the lovely accommodation staff at Guesthouse Bitra and load up all of our cases onto the coach before travelling to the famous geothermal pool known as Blue Lagoon for a swim and some relaxation before the flight home. The pool's average temperature ranges between 30-40°C and its silica-rich geothermal seawater is drawn from a 2000 m deep borehole. We were all incredibly lucky that the pool was open for us to enjoy, as earthquakes in the region had affected the opening hours of the Blue Lagoon in recent weeks.

We took our final group photo outside the Blue Lagoon before then heading to the airport to travel home on the Sunday night.

Despite the slight delay to the flight, all made it home safe and sound – and just in time for school on Monday morning!

As trip leader, I couldn't be prouder of the group of students we took on this trip. They were all put out of their comfort zones in so many ways, yet attacked every activity with such a positive attitude, showing willingness to get involved in so many unique activities and experiences. They were polite and well-mannered throughout, receiving huge compliments from our tour guide, Bernie, the driver, Palli and all the

Guesthouse Bitra staff. I hope they all have the most incredible and fun memories from this wonderful trip experience!

ABSENCE REPORTING VIA EDULINK


Dear Parent/Carer

This is just a reminder that all absences should now be reported via Edulink.

When you log into Edulink you will be able to see a new icon shaped like a bell (Absence Reporting) as per the image to the right.

When you click on this you will be taken to a page where absences are reported (Image 2). Your child's name and photo will appear where the blue box sits in the image below.

- For illness we ask that you only report one day at a time on the day of absence.
- However, you will be able to report an absence for medical appointments, etc. in advance.
- Holiday requests should still be requested via our Leave of Absence form that can be collected from any reception and is also available on Edulink (Noticeboard, Forms).
- ♦ Select date From* and To*
- Insert Reason for Absence*. Please do not state unwell or illness. Please specify details of the issue as you would have done via our previous recorded telephone calls (example in Image 2).





Without wishing to state the obvious, please ensure that you click 'SEND'. This will send a message and an email to our Attendance Manager.

Should we not receive a communication from you we will send an absence call/message – normally around 10.00am. We do expect parents to respond to this for safeguarding reasons.

Should you have any information that you would like to discuss regarding your child's absence we would ask you make contact with your child's Form Tutor and/or Year Manager.

Please ensure that all absences are reported by 8.25am.

STUDENTS VISIT AUSCHWITZ AND BIRKENAU







On Tuesday 14 November, we travelled to Poland with the Holocaust Educational Trust to visit the town of Oświęcim and both concentration camps, Auschwitz and Birkenau, as part of their Lessons from Auschwitz programme. Although this was a very tiring and emotional experience, especially as the visit was only for a day, it was highly eye-opening and interesting, as we had the opportunity to learn about pre-war Jewish life, the impact the Holocaust had on the local community and also consider the contemporary relevance of what we learned today.

In addition to this, we heard the testimony of Holocaust survivor Mala Tribich, giving us a very personal insight into her experience of the Holocaust as a young teenager, where we were also given the opportunity to ask her questions. This was even more poignant as we are the last generation who will be able to hear from Holocaust survivors. We are now planning our next steps project, planning to educate the College community about our experience for Holocaust Memorial Day in January. This will be an opportunity for us to pass on the lessons we learned from the programme and ensure the remembrance of the Holocaust in our generation, to make certain such atrocities never happen again.

SOPHIE SPENDS GOLD DOFE RESIDENTIAL AT LOCAL HOSPITAL

My Gold DofE residential experience was at Basingstoke Hospital, where each day was spent either on the ward or in the training rooms with a Cardiology consultant running our itinerary. It was not originally on the 'Opportunity Finder' on the DofE website, but I kept checking and this one eventually came up. It is a new programme between Hampshire Outdoors and Basingstoke Hospital, where we are driven between the hospital and the accommodation every day.

Over the course of the week we shadowed doctors on ward rounds and took part in asking questions to the patients. The consultant also taught us how to use high tech equipment and then we practiced using it on each other. For the whole week we felt as though we were mini doctors and were treated as such, along with many other doctors from all specialities and stages in their career giving talks to really show us that even though doctors have the same initial training, each pathway is so different as does not have to start straight out of A levels.

At the accommodation, we were timetabled into a rota and took turns being responsible for everyday chores such as preparing breakfast and dinner, then washing up afterwards. As it was a medical-related course everyone had the same intention of applying to undertake a medicine course, and this created a group of like-minded people so there was a real community spirit and determination to just get on and complete tasks which made the week go by so fast. Firm friendships were made after the first day which made the week easier and we are all still in contact today, sharing each other's achievements within the application process as, anybody who undertakes this, knows how tough it can be. For me, it was the perfect choice with my future aspirations to become a doctor.

This experience proves that each residential can be tailored to each person with their future aspirations in mind – ensuring they will enjoy the week and be provided with opportunities that can be a stepping stone to the next stage in their career.

SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL ENCOURAGES RESIDENTS TO OFFER SUPPORTED LODGINGS/FOSTER

Supported Lodgings and Fostering are both incredibly rewarding experiences that can transform the lives of both the children/young people being supported and the carers' themselves. Children and young people who enter the care system have often experienced trauma and instability in their lives, and a stable and supportive carer family can make a significant difference in their wellbeing and development.

Nationally, there are currently over 70,000 children living with carer families in the UK. However, there is still a significant shortage of Supported Lodgings and foster carers, with around 9,265 new carer families needed in the next year alone. In Surrey, there are over 1000 children in care and Surrey County Council have just under 400 carer families.

Supported Lodgings is targeted at young adults aged 16-21 to help them build their independence skills ready to live independently in the future, from the security of a caring, stable home environment.

Supported Lodgings Carers and Foster Carers come from all walks of life and backgrounds, and there is no one-size-fits-all approach to caring. Whether you are single or married, young or old, own your own home or rent, you can still become a carer. The most important thing is a willingness to provide a safe and loving home for a child in need.

This is the message that Surrey County Council is promoting in national recruitment film 'Any of Us'. The short film has been jointly funded by over 80 councils across England and aims to raise awareness about fostering, particularly among those people who may not have previously considered themselves suited to caring for vulnerable children and young people. The film looks at the potential of three people from different backgrounds to become carers, and the potential of children they care for to grow and thrive.

If you have ever thought about fostering, or offering Supported Lodgings, now is the time to take that first step and find out more. The more people who consider caring, the greater the chance of finding loving, stable homes for children in Surrey who desperately need them.




