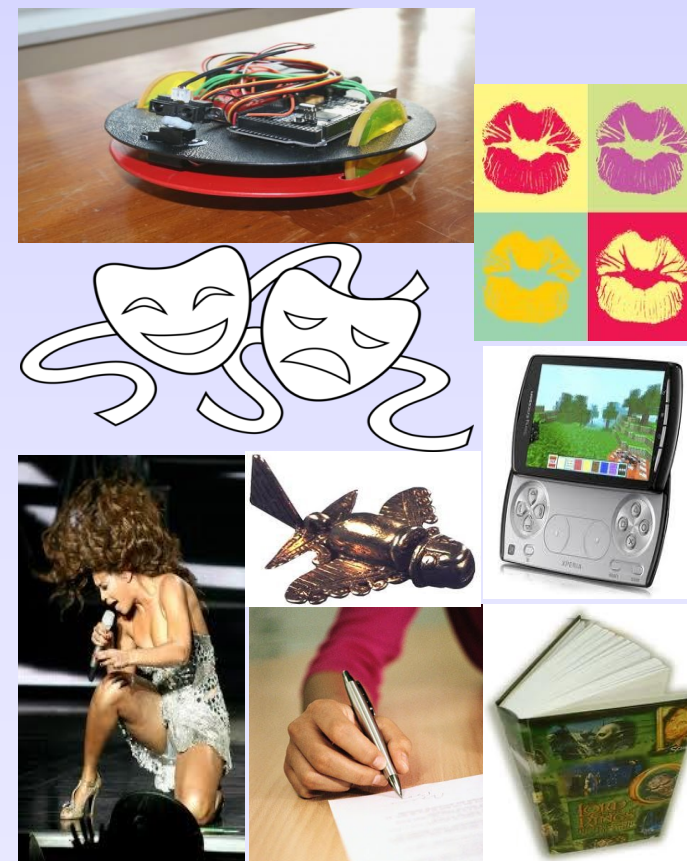
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EXTENDED PROJECT



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What is an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)?

The EPQ is a stand alone qualification that is equivalent to half an A Level qualification that has been developed to with the intention of strengthening the programme of Post 16 study by testing a wider range of skills.

It provides a toolkit for you that better prepares you for higher education and employment. The skills that you develop through the Extended Project are excellent preparation for university-level study, and many universities have endorsed it.

You can refer to the Extended Project in your UCAS personal statements and at interview, to demonstrate some of the qualities that universities are looking for.

You will be allocated a project supervisor who you will be timetabled to see once a week which will include a 1:1 meeting.

There is a taught element and you will attend tutorials from time to time, but a lot of this project is down to you, your time management, your planning, your research and meeting deadlines independently.

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What can I research?

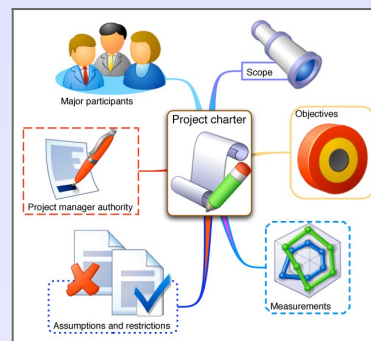
EPQ comprises of a single piece of work of your choosing and requires evidence of planning, preparation, research, and independent learning.

An Extended Project might be:

- A report with findings from an investigation or study
- An artefact designed and created by the student
- A dissertation presenting an argument
- A performance
- A book
- A film/video/CD
- A photographic/artistic study
- A product



The list is endless. What you need is enthusiasm and a passion for what you have chosen to study. This could be for personal reasons or for reasons of further study / employment.



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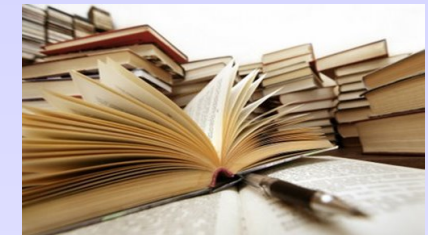
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How will I be assessed?

Your final outcome will be assessed by your project supervisor.

The marks will be allocated as follows:

- 20% for planning
- 20% for research and showing a variety of sources of research
- 40% for your findings / main body / creation
- 20% for your evaluation and reflection at the end.



When could I undertake an Extended Project qualification?

- In Year 12 as an AS option
- In Year 13 as an AS option to enhance your current study

You will ideally be following a programme equivalent to 3 A levels although all students will be considered.

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
